KENTUCKY 4-H SUMMIT 2023

Middle School 4-H delegates from across the state recently attended the 13th annual Kentucky 4-H Teen Summit at the Lake Cumberland 4-H Educational Center in Jabez, Kentucky. The conference is held annually for youth in grades 6-8 who want to learn more about what Kentucky 4-H can offer and make connections with others from across the state.

The program is designed to encourage youth to continue their involvement in 4-H as they transition from middle to high school. Members of the Kentucky State 4-H Teen Council serve as teen volunteers during the event, providing mentorship opportunities between the middle and high school 4-H'ers. These teen leaders are in charge of teaching a leadership workshop.



Throughout the conference, youth are encouraged to make new friends, develop their leadership skills and experience new learning opportunities in a safe and supportive environment. Additionally, at each Summit session a different Leadership Board is showcased by teaching workshops and leading the final assembly. The Kentucky 4-H Leadership Boards involved

include: Science, Engineering and Technology, Fashion Leadership Board and Performing Arts Troupe.

This past year, participants were able to learn valuable leadership, communication, and citizenship skills through different workshop sessions. In

addition to these valuable skills, participants also gained new knowledge and had fun playing volleyball, creating art, hiking, conducting STEM experiments, dancing, and playing various outdoor sports. The youth who attended from Floyd County were Jonah Watts, Braxton Newsome and Noah Watts from John M. Stumbo Elementary.

4-H ISSUES CONFERENCE GIVES YOUTH A VOICE

4-H strives to give youth the skills they need to be adults who are actively engaged in their communities. Since 1989, Kentucky 4-H has given its senior members an opportunity to attend the four-day statewide Issues Conference to learn how to identify and address local issues while developing their leadership and citizenship skills.

This year's 4-H Issues Conference is November 17-19, 2023 at Feltner 4-H Camp in London, Kentucky. Conference delegates are high school-age youth with demonstrated leadership ability or potential, other organizational involvement, excellent communication skills, issue awareness and commitment to action.



Delegates identify and research a local issue affecting young people

before coming to the conference. At the conference, 4-H'ers have the opportunity to present their issue and ideas for a solution. They also have a chance to collaborate with others from around the state to work toward a solution. Adult facilitators help lead the group to develop a presentation on their issue aimed at a community board. At the end of the conference, teams can apply for a mini grant to address their issue.

The conference is designed to teach delegates about citizenship and civic engagement. They gain an understanding of local issues and the process of addressing those issues. In the process, they enhance their public presentation skills and their leadership skills. Those who want to return for a more advanced session can return as a delegate to Issues Conference Level Two. This year Floyd County 4-H had three Delegates from Prestonsburg High School who represented us at the Conference. Laken Shepherd, Mya Burgess, and Brianna Webb.
